STEVE D'SOUZA, MD

Please tell us about yourself: I came to EVMS as a medical student in 2014, and completed my residency here in internal medicine. This year, I serve as one of the two chief residents before starting my fellowship in gastroenterology at Case Western MetroHealth this summer.

Describe the studies you are currently involved in: I am currently working to investigate the role of esophageal microbiome plays in the pathogenesis of gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD). GERD can lead to tissue metaplasia and esophageal cancer, but many patients with longstanding GERD never develop metaplasia. We suspect that the composition of bacteria in esophageal lumen is a key reason, and are investigating mechanisms by which we can change this pathway through new therapeutics.

Do you have any research mentors? If so, what have they taught you? My first research mentor was Dr. Dianne Pawluk, the PI of a haptics lab at VCU, where I worked on developing accessible devices for individuals who are blind and visually impaired. She taught me the foundations of every step of dry lab research, from coming up with a research question to presenting data to the scientific community. This bend experience was invaluable to work with my next mentors here at EVMS, Drs. Chris Stout, David Dexter, and Jean Panneton in the Vascular Surgery division, where I was able to gain an appreciation for, and apply those skills towards clinical research in peripheral arterial disease. Finally, in medical school, I was fortunate to meet Dr. David Johnson, who has become my career mentor and sponsor in gastroenterology. Under his guidance, I have worked on numerous translational research projects, systematic reviews, book chapters, and grant applications. Through this work, I was able to identify my subject-matera area of interst – esophageal disease.

What skills do you hope to develop as a researcher moving forward? One area that particularly interests me is the creation of meta-analyses and writing society guidelines. Most major medical societies use the GRADE framework for assessing quality and certainty of evidence. I was fortunate to attend the GRADE Working Group conference this past winter to learn more about this process.

What is your favorite hobby, a recent book you've read, or TV show you've watched...and tell us what you enjoy about it! My favorite hobby is reading biographies. I recently read the biography of Marie Curie written by her daughter, Eve Curie. She was such a remarkable individuals, and the biographer notes by her daughter at the end personalized her outside of her astounding scientific career.
