



Researcher Spotlight — Madeeha Deo, MD

What excites you about research and what type of investigations are you currently working on? I like how research can validate what we often see anecdotally in clinical practice. I've always believed that the stories we hear from patients & the patterns we observe as providers deserve to be explored and proven through research. Although I'm earlier in my research career, I'm drawn to projects that have a direct impact on patient outcomes and health equity. Working with adults living with sickle cell disease, I've become even more aware of how much remains unknown, even about a disease we've recognized for over a century. Being able to ask questions, investigate gaps, and contribute to evidence that could improve quality of life for patients — that's what keeps me excited and motivated to keep learning.



Have you had any research mentors over the years? If so, what have they taught you, and how did you find them? I've been fortunate to have mentors throughout my career. They have shown me that research isn't just about academic productivity, it's about asking the right questions that come directly from patient care. They taught me that good research starts with noticing the gaps, the patterns, and the frustrations we encounter every day. One of the mentors who has had a strong influence on my current development is Dr. Rehan Qayyum. His background, in various leadership roles at institutions like John Hopkins and VCU, brings a deep research perspective to clinical practice. He has helped broaden how I think about career development as an internal medicine physician. He has encouraged me to look beyond patient care and toward building clinical expertise through research and scholarly work & reinforced the importance of staying curious, patient centered, and willing to keep asking the bigger questions that can ultimately lead to better systems of care.

Describe the studies you are currently working on. Can medical students, residents, or fellows join your team? I'm leading a retrospective study that investigates hospital readmissions & length of stay in adults living with sickle cell disease at SNGH. We're analyzing over a decade of patient data to better understand what factors (clinical, social and systemic) predict higher readmission rates and prolonged hospital stays. I'm especially interested in how medication adherence, social vulnerability, and chronic complications like pain and organ damage impact outcomes over time. As SCD has been historically understudied in adult populations, this project is an important step toward building better predictive models & improving long term management. Absolutely, medical students, residents and fellows are welcome to join our team! I truly believe that engaging learners in research early—helps them connect the dots between clinical care and systems level change.

What is your favorite hobby outside of work? Tell us what you enjoy about it. Outside of work, my greatest joy comes from spending time with my family. I have two young boys and I'm very intentional about the time we share, knowing that every experience, every small moment, paves a future path for them. I also find a lot of peace and strength through moments of quiet reflection and spiritual grounding, which helps me stay centered amidst the demands of clinical work, research and leadership. Having that inner compass keeps me focused on service, gratitude and growth. Lately, I've been reflecting on Letter to a Young Female Physician: Thoughts on Life and Work by Suzanne Koven. Even though I haven't finished it yet, the parts I've read really resonated with me, especially how it captures the quieter, more personal struggles many physicians experience behind the scenes.
